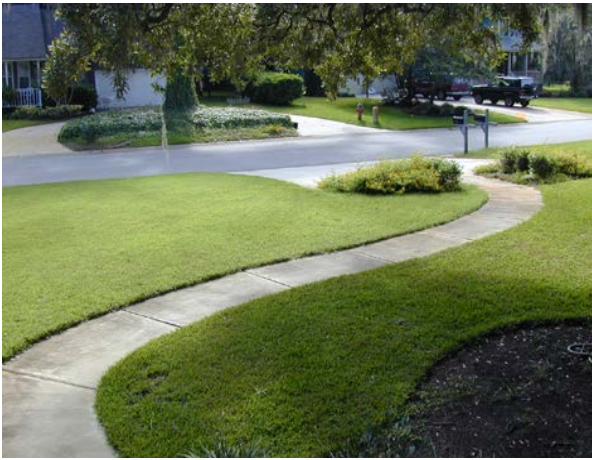


UTILITIES, INC. OF FLORIDA Water Allocation Flyer



Water is one of Florida’s most precious resources. As the use of groundwater increases, the unit cost of providing water will undoubtedly increase too. Water conservation is an important part of life in Florida. Utilities Inc. of Florida encourages your support of the St. Johns River Water Management District’s irrigation policies. Conservation is not only environmentally important, it will very likely reduce your monthly water bill. Our Consumptive Use Permit (CUP), as issued by the District, assumes an irrigation rate of 38.2 in/yr. In order to determine the optimum allocation, the District takes into account the size of a lot and local soil types. Your individual maximum allocation of irrigation water can be calculated based on your lot size. The table below illustrates efficient water use for typical lot sizes within and without your community.

Note: Any individual who can demonstrate legitimate need to irrigate more than the times below can apply for a Standard General Permit at www.floridaswater.com. Any customer approved for a Standard General Permit shall notify the Utility promptly.

Know Your Days - Mandatory lawn watering restrictions specify the days when you may water. Your watering days depend on whether you have an odd or even numbered address and the time of year. You should run your irrigation system no more than once per week from November through mid-March. You should irrigate no more than twice per week from mid-March through October.

Time of year	Homes with odd numbered or no addresses	Homes with even numbered addresses	Nonresidential properties
Daylight Savings	Wednesday/Saturday	Thursday/Sunday	Tuesday/Friday
Standard Time	Saturday	Sunday	Tuesday

- Daylight saving time: Second Sunday in March until the first Sunday in November
- Eastern Standard Time: First Sunday in November until the second Sunday in March
- An odd numbered address is one that ends in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9.
- An even numbered address is one that ends in 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8.
- Water only when needed and not between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Water for no more than one hour per zone.
- Restrictions apply to private wells and pumps, ground or surface source water, and water provided by public and private utilities.
